# What We Are Doing Physical Needs





## **Healthy Meals**

KIND continues to provide quality, healthy meals thanks to a wonderful staff and volunteers led by Joe Tindall and Peggy Fox. Kroger and the Food Bank provide food for the program and Grace United Methodist Church provides catered meals for the kids in our program

The increased attendance over the summer drove our feeding numbers over expectations. We served 11,272 meals which was above our goal of 8,000. We provided 940 food backpacks in 2019 based on a goal of 1,000. Those numbers compare to 8,468 meals and 1,325 backpacks during 2018.

### **Backpacks from Catholic Social Services**

In September, we received over 80 backpacks full of school supplies from Catholic Social Services and distributed all of them to kids in kindergarten through 8th grade. Picking out their new backpack was a highlight for our kids and helped them be ready to do their best at school!



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#### Shoes for the Shoeless – S4TS

S4TS serves as our largest outreach for the year. On May 18<sup>th</sup> we hosted our first S4TS event where 310 children received a free pair of shoes and a bag of socks. S4TS, Memorial Church, Living Word Church, KIND board members, staff, and volunteers made the event a huge success. With all our community events, we fed the children and their families. Living Word Church brought their food truck to feed over 300 people at the event. We were unable to schedule the second S4TS event in 2019 but will schedule the next event in early 2020.

#### Transportation

Critical to addressing attendance is reliable transportation. KIND received support in late 2018 and early 2019 to purchase two used vans with funding from the Kettering Family Foundation, Physicians' Charitable Foundation, and Mark Kreusch Foundation. KIND is indebted to Jeff Miller and Miller Collision for putting graphics on our vans to identify ourselves in the neighborhood we serve.

Soon after these two vans were put into service, one older van experienced engine failure while transporting children. This situation reduced us to four vans which created quite a challenge during the summer program with 150 children registered. In early 2020, we received approval for the Mark A. Kreusch Foundation and the Kettering Family Foundation for monies to replace an older van with maintenance issues. We will have four newer vans and an older backup to safely and reliably transport the children.







### Reading

We have made great strides in making sure reading is consistently emphasized and supported by staff. With a significant refugee population in our community, staff has to adjust our reading program to allow some children to listen to books.

During the 2019 summer program, students engaged in reading through the online RAZ (Reading A-Z) Kids program. In RAZ Kids, students are placed at an appropriate reading level to facilitate growth and lessen frustration. This is trial and error for KIND instructors because we lack a tool that will effectively give us the reading level of each student. Students read a book then complete a quiz at the end of their reading. This helps students practice their fluency and comprehension.

Students spent an hour and thirty minutes a week reading - nine hours over the summer. Overall, the children read 630 hours over the summer: 837 audio (refugee children) and 847 read. On average, each student listened to 11.96 books and read 12.1 books.

### Science

Providing STEM skills is critical to meeting the growing base of technical jobs. For many years, Ohio's tech-job sector grew slower than 38 other states. The tide is turning, with the pipeline of STEM-related jobs larger than the resource pipeline. At KIND, Science, Technology, Teamwork, Engineering, and Math (STTEM) is a cornerstone program, teaching students how to problem solve and work together. We will continue to develop and support these skills.



We believe teamwork is a major factor in STTEM and in life as well. 90% of the groups worked very well together as opposed to only 50% of groups working well together two years ago.

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#### Math

One of our Dayton School teachers focused on developing math skills through classroom instruction. In January and May, students took an interactive online placement test through www.learnmathfastbooks.com as a pretest and post-test. Each time they take the test it determines at what grade level they perform. We had some really strong results. The Kindergarten through Second Grade increased test scores 78% from the pretest. The Third to Fifth Grade class increased pretest scores by 56%.



### Play Impossible<sup>™</sup>



In 2019, the Iddings Foundation and the Reynolds Associates Foundation provided support to expand programming and materials for STTEM. The first program launched was the Play Impossible Ball Gameball<sup>™</sup>, a kinetic toy that integrates team-based physical activity and data analytics. Play Impossible has a built-in computer that reads different actions performed with the ball. As students participate in the various games, the ball gathers data which is then displayed on an app to show the height of a throw, reaction of a movement, or the rotation of the ball.

Students are always excited to participate in the Play Impossible games, and it has deepened their understanding on how data can be displayed and collected. A great example is a game where students need to throw the ball a certain height, not just as high as they can throw. When we introduced the game, students just threw it as high as they could. After a few tries they began understanding the need to throw the ball a certain height to collect a certain amount of data. They engaged in Play Impossible games two hours a day, two days a week over the summer. KIND's next step is to teach students how to navigate through the app so they are able to play with others independently.



### **Outdoor Classroom**

Our Outdoor Classroom is a key part of program results, since it is a gathering place for children and families as a neighborhood playground. It serves as the backdrop for STEM classes so our children can experiment in an outdoor environment. We also hold our exercise programs and games in this area. The Outdoor Classroom allows us to expand programs, the minds and bodies of children, and serve as the center of community events.

## How We Are Doing

#### Attendance

KIND grew substantially over the summer. We increased students registered in the summer program by 26% over 2018. Our goal to maintain attendance also aligns with Dayton Public Schools, who is promoting attendance as the number one success factor. KIND experienced strong attendance to meet our goal for the year even though Fall was down slightly at 68%. In 2020, we are implementing new strategies to raise attendance rates while increasing retention.

Also critical is student retention for Spring to Summer and from Summer to Fall. Our retention was strong again this year, with Spring to Summer retention rates the strongest, and the transition to Fall lower. Reasons include the transition from summer break to the school year, illness, and the longer break between sessions.



### **Community Partnering**

#### **Christmas Party**

The Dayton Masonic Lodge No. 147 once again honored us with a Christmas party invitation. We brought 17 kids from kindergarten to 2nd grade and were amazed at all the activities that had been planned. The kids made crafts, won prizes from Bingo, pinned the nose on a picture of Santa, threw rings onto reindeer antlers, ate lots of pizza, and received a gift from Santa himself. What a morning! It was truly moving to see what this meant to the kids.

#### **Christmas Decorations**

Through a connection with Day Yoga, Lululemon learned about KIND and wanted to do something special for the kids when they returned from Christmas break. Their team went



all out in decorating the KIND building and preparing individual gift bags for the children. It was quite the surprise on the first day back when we opened the doors for the big reveal!



**Praying In Every Language** Because they know that God speaks all of the languages, the kids taught each other (and the staff) how to say "Thank You Father" in our most common languages - Kinyarwanda, Swahili, Spanish, and Arabic





# New for 2020

### Programming

In 2020, KIND will be introducing three new programs:

- Cooking at Dayton Children's Hospital
- Yoga with DAY Yoga
- Nature Connect at The Glen

We will partner with the University of Dayton on a cooking/nutrition class at the new Community Kitchen at Dayton Children's Hospital. Cooking promotes healthy eating, develops life skills, applies reading and math skills, enhances fine motor skills, and encourages family time.

The Day Yoga Studios community outreach program partnered with us to bring yoga instructors to KIND for several weeks last fall and are back this winter! The kids have not only learned fun yoga poses (like elephant, tiger, and hippo!), they are learning principles and techniques for calmness, focus, and peace. As you can see in the photo, the kids love their teachers!

Children will connect with the natural world around them through Nature Connect at The Glen and the Boonshoft Museum of Discovery. Studies show that time spent in nature increases attention span, ability to concentrate, self-esteem, creativity, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills. Children who spend more time outdoors and participate in cooperative group activities also have healthier relationships with friends and family.



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# Leadership

### **Tim Honchel – Director**

We are excited to announce Tim Honchel as the Director of KIND. Previously, Tim worked for KIND as a coordinator and brings extensive inner-city experience from his work with the Catholic Social Services' refugee resettlement program. He currently works part-time for Miami Valley Career Technology Center as an English as a Second Language teacher. Tim arrived thoroughly prepared and in December submitted his plan to the board to ensure alignment with our Strategic Plan. His approach leverages our partners while focusing our resources on ministering to the children within our greater neighborhood. He sees KIND as a key player in the story of Dayton's children and will do all he can to guide and empower our staff and volunteers in delivering the highest quality program possible. KIND can make a lasting difference in our children's academic performance, overall well-being, and inner character. Tim's leadership direction and impact with staff, volunteers, and students is a definite asset to the KIND team.
